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Introduction to Exam Skills





Understanding connection between ideas

To find the relationship (e.g. cause and effect) between one thing in the question and another thing in the text.





Interpreting data from charts

To find the relationship between the x-axis and y-axis in a chart and look for related information from the chart.





Making a reference

To find out what a specific word (usually a pronoun like 'me' and 'his') refers to in the text.





Guessing the meaning of unfamiliar words

To guess the meaning of unfamiliar words in the text by paying attention to words around them.





Identifying the main idea

To find the general idea of the text and summarise it in a few words.



At dinner time, he ate more food than his dad! 'Don't be greedy!' his dad shouted.


Everybody was worried about Joe. They knew that Joe would become very ill if he kept eating so much food. Joe's parents decided to ask the wise woman in their village for help.




