

We use these question words to ask about things:

Question word	Meaning	Question	Answer
What?	Object / Idea	What is your name?	My name is Tom.
Where?	Location	Where are you going?	I'm going to a party.
Whose?	Possession	Whose party is it?	It's May's party.
Why?	Reason	Why is May having a party?	It's her birthday.
When?	Time	When does May's party start?	It starts at 3 o'clock.
Which?	Choice	Which street does she live in?	She lives in Tsun Fat Street.
Who?	Identity	Who else is coming?	Alex is coming.

© Grammar explained (2): verb + to + verb (infinitive)

In English, it is common for sentences to contain two verbs connected with the word **'to'**. The second verb is always in the **infinitive** form.

e.g. He wants to buy a computer.

Here are some of the most common examples of verbs that are followed by 'to + verb (infinitive)'.

forget to	expect to	choose to	decide to


